The Lutheran Church begins celebrating 500 years of the reformation on the 499th anniversary of Reformation Day. Traditionally, the Lutheran Church teaches the Reformation began on October 31, 1517 when Martin Luther posted his 95 Thesis on the door of Wittenberg's Castle Church. What started as a desire to reform practices within the Roman Catholic Church gave birth to the Protestant movement.

Beginning the celebration now is similar to our New Year's Eve parties. On December 31, at the end of every year, people begin celebrating the new year before the old one ends. Roman Catholic leaders, including Pope Francis, will join with Lutheran Leaders, in a worship service on October 31 this month in Lund Sweden. Decades of dialogue between Rome and global Lutheran fellowship has brought closer relations between our leaders and people. This worship service seeks to bring connection where there once was division.

OCTOBER 30, 2016 CONFIRMATION OF RHIANNON WISEMAN JACKSON KIGER Christ Lutheran's Reformation +500+ festivities begin a day earlier on Sunday, October 30 with the confirmation of Rhiannon Wiseman and Jackson Kiger. Through their presence and their gifts they have brought much joy into the life of this congregation. We look forward to this opportunity to pray for them and encourage their faith as they approach adulthood.

PULLING WEEDS

How true, how true. I've watched the plants and flowers in the "Memorial Garden" all summer and no matter how many times Becky Rhodes pulls weeds in the garden, new weeds appear before the end of the day. One Thursday, Becky had spent the morning weeding and when I left the church in the early afternoon, there was not one in sight. Then on Sunday morning there were two humongous weeds, more than three feet tall standing boldly in the midst of the flowers. Becky laughed and said this was a problem for her but was pretty normal. She made the statement, " How helpful it would be if everyone who passed by the garden would pull just one weed".

This declaration caused me to think what a profound statement she had made. When we look at the various irritations in life we could relieve stress and pain if we would help one another, even in the simplest tasks. And most of the time it would not cost us a thing but a little consideration and love.

I received a birthday card this year with a short note from someone I had not expected to send me one. I cannot tell you, nor the sender how much that card and note meant to me. It made my spirits jump to new heights and even gave me energy to attack the tasks I had been avoiding. She did some "weed pulling" for me that brought about flowers.

A phone call to someone you haven't seen in church for awhile lets one know that you are "pulling weeds" and are thinking of the person; that you hope all is well and if not could you be of help. A smile to a distraught mother or father in the store with a pleasant comment could be so comforting. And remember to add children and teenagers to your list of pleasantries. Bend down when speaking to children so they can see the love in your eyes. Give the teenager a pat on the back. This may mean "weed pulling" but will give a soothing calmness, a chance for the flowers to grow.

Try not to add to the production of weeds. When hearing negatives try to add commonsense, positives and productive "weed pulling." Remember the old song from Johnny Mercer (and I mean old) *Accentuate the positive, eliminate the negative.*"

Yes, let us plant the seeds but remember to help pull the weeds.

FROM YOUR DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

As we enter the month of October, we begin the year-long celebration of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation begun by Martin Luther in 1517 with the nailing of the 95 theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. I have been to that church, and while the original doors are no longer there, the church is a powerful place in which to worship. I have played the organ and have sung around Luther's tomb. I have heard the gospel proclaimed from that place in word and in music. All of you probably know something about Martin Luther and know him primarily as the Father of the Protestant Reformation. But, did you know that Luther was also a musician? He valued good music, and surrounded himself with good musicians to help him give to this new church, hymns and liturgical music in the people's own language. Luther said, "Next to the Word of God, music deserves the highest praise."

Over the next year, I will be including articles each month on different aspects of Luther as a musician and what his music has meant to the church through the last 500 years, and how it is still meaningful and powerful today. And, not only Luther's music, but the music of all those who have been profoundly influenced by Luther's theology and have continued to proclaim the Word of God through music.

All of the music sung and played in Christ Lutheran Church's worship services, is proclaiming what we believe, whether the music contains text or not. When Bach is played on the organ, we are called to remember that everything he wrote, he inscribed "Soli Deo Gloria!", To God alone be the glory! So, when you hear preludes, offertories, postludes, hymn introductions, instrumental pieces, soloists, etc., know that it is all "Soli Deo Gloria!" You can use the time before and during worship to meditate on scripture, hymn stanzas, or in prayer. We are gathered in a fellowship of believers, and we are one in Christ. Let's celebrate that communion by talking to each other when the service ends, and speaking with God before and during worship.

Luther: Let's Bust Some Myths

"Bar song bunk"

Timothy J. Wengert, a well-known theologian, busts the myth that the tune of Luther's best-known hymn is based on a barroom song, but the truth remains that "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" is an artistic and theological *tour de force* whose message has resonated for 500 years. As a study group, exam-



ine the "bar form" structure of the hymn. Then look at the poetry of the hymn as translated in Evangelical Lutheran Worship, pages 503-505. Items for discussion:


- What gospel messages of hope can you distill from the poem?
- What theology of Christianity is encapsulated there?
- What are the quintessentially "Lutheran" elements?

As an extra step, ask these same questions of other hymns for which Luther is credited (there are 19 listed on the index in *ELW*, page 1191).
